Press conference devolves over unexpected bribery

A camper inquired how Kirk shares his beliefs to others and he answered by encouraging her to share her beliefs with love while reminding her that "the gospel is offensive" and reminded all of the campers that the truth of the

gospel is much more important than social acceptance from the culture. Kirk was also asked his opinion on women as pastors and responded by referring to the Apostle Paul's approach to this issue by informing campers that women's roles are not in pastoral leadership. However, women can still serve in other areas of the church and are a necessary function within the body of Christ.

This was Kirk's third year at LEAD and many campers enjoy his fiery personality and passion for service to the Lord. His inspiring words provide a sense of courage and motivation to impact the world as ambassadors for Christ and an appreciation for both the United States and its Constitution.
